# **TEACHING**

#### GRADUATE COURSES

# Research and Professional Development Seminar (University of Florida, S 2023)

A seminar designed to support graduate students as they complete their dissertation and plan for a career after earning their Philosophy PhD. Students can expect opportunities to workshop their writing, develop job market materials (such as a CV, teaching portfolio, research statement, and diversity statement), and learn about research prospects in their areas of interest (including conferences, fellowships and grants, and journals). Information and tools for pursuing academic careers will be presented, as will strategies for marketing a Philosophy PhD across disciplines and outside of the academy. Students will be afforded resources from UF and beyond to aid in professionalization and job marketing.

# **Kant** (University of Florida, F 2022)

A graduate level seminar exploring Kant's ethics, and specifically Kant's moral psychology. Readings include *Groundwork for the Metaphysics of Morals, Critique of Practical Reason, Metaphysics of Morals, Lectures on Ethics, Anthropology from a Pragmatic Point of View,* and *Pedagogy*.

# **Equality** (University of Florida, F 2021)

A graduate level seminar on contemporary philosophical literature on egalitarianism. Readings by Derek Parfit, Richard Arneson, Larry Tempkin, GA Cohen, Elizabeth Anderson, and Debra Satz, among others.

# Rawls (University of Florida, F 2018)

A graduate level seminar exploring the work of John Rawls, A Theory of Justice.

# **Disability in Ethics** (University of Florida, S 2017)

A graduate level seminar exploring Disability in Ethics, including: what is disability?; what are persons with disabilities owed as a matter of social justice?; what is the relevance of disability status to educational justice?

# **Ideal and Nonideal Theory** (University of Florida, S 2013)

A graduate level seminar investigating the nature of the ideal/nonideal distinction in ethics and political philosophy, and objections to doing ideal theory.

Ethical Theory 1 (University of Florida, F 2011, F 2013, F 2015)

A graduate seminar survey course on the four major branches of normative ethics: consequentialism, deontology, contractarianism/contractualism, and virtue ethics. Readings were both classical and contemporary.

#### UNDERGRADUATE COURSES

# **Morality & Politics** (University of Florida, S 2022)

A senior level seminar exploring the relationship (if there is one!) between morality and politics. The course focuses on themes of 'dirty hands', as well as the place of morality in political leadership, citizenship, and policy.

# Ethics and the Public Sphere—Quest 1 (University of Florida, S 2019, S 2020)

This interdisciplinary General Education course explores the how the methods and traditions in the humanities provide resources for approaching publicly relevant ethical issues. Topics include freedom of speech, economic inequality, and sex and gender justice. Philosophical and legal arguments, laws, papal encyclicals, pastoral letters, historical analyses, and news articles are incorporated into our course readings. The crucial skills we will emphasize throughout the class include identifying the moral dimensions of legal, political, and economic problems; critically evaluating traditions and perspectives; appreciating the diversity of perspectives on these controversial issues; thinking beyond one's own interests; and approaching disagreement with openmindedness and a willingness to be rationally persuaded.

# **Global Justice** (University of Florida, F 2017)

An upper division introduction to political philosophy at the global scale. Topics include: the relationship between global and domestic justice; obligations to the global poor; the ethics of immigration.

Feminist Philosophy (University of Florida, F 2014, F 2015, F 2016, F 2017, F 2019)

An upper division introduction to the philosophy of feminism including discussion of the following: sexism and oppression; the nature of gender and of sexual orientation; the possibilities for liberation.

# **Philosophy of Education** (University of Florida, F 2014, F 2019)

An upper division introduction to the philosophy of education. Topics include: the aims and purposes of education, educational authority, the distribution of educational opportunity, and the special role of higher education in our society.

**Contemporary Moral Issues** (University of Florida, S 2012, S 2014; Online version taught S 2016, S 2017, S 2018)

An introductory survey of controversial ethical topics, considered from a philosophical perspective. Issues have included capital punishment, abortion, the moral status of non-human animals, human enhancement, race, sexuality, and friendship.

**Political Philosophy** (University of Florida, S/F 2012, S 2013, S 2014, S 2016, F 2018, S 2022) A course on contemporary liberal political theory. We read Rawls's *Justice as Fairness* to begin, and then examine the surrounding literature, including expressions of the following: the capabilities approach, libertarianism, group rights theories, equality of resources and welfare theories, and some anti-liberal theories. The course concludes with some of the challenges to liberalism raised by gender, disability, and the family.

**Moral Philosophy** (University of Florida, F 2010, S/F 2011, F 2012, F 2013, F 2016, F 2022, F2023)

A course focusing primarily on the questions of normative ethics, such as: What fundamental principles, if any, should govern our ethical decisions? What constitutes a good life, or makes a human being good? What kinds of human relationships are worth having or striving for?

# **Contemporary Moral Issues** (UW Madison, 2x)

A survey of four controversial ethical topics, considered from a philosophical perspective. Topics included capital punishment, abortion, the moral status of non-human animals, and reproductive cloning. This class filled a university communications requirement, and so was writing, reading, and discussion intensive.
