COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Bioethics is the study of ethical issues arising from the biological and medical sciences. It includes questions about how health care providers ought to treat their patients, questions about what topics research scientists ought to study and the methods that they may permissibly use, and questions about how we should relate to present and future generations of human and non-human life. This course will equip you with some of the concepts, theories, and information you will need in order to formulate and justify answers to these and related questions.

COURSE MATERIALS:

You do not need to purchase any required or recommended textbooks for this course. All required and recommended readings will be available on our Canvas website.

COURSE GOALS:

- Better understand some of the central developments in the field of bioethics
- Improve your ability to read for arguments, reconstruct the arguments you have read, and evaluate the arguments you have reconstructed
- Improve your ability to reason about moral theories, arguments, and issues
- Improve your ability to express yourself in speech and writing with clarity, depth, and precision

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Each quiz will consist of 4 multiple-choice and 3 short-answer questions. The exams will consist of multiple-choice, short-answer, and essay questions. I will post study guides for the quizzes and exams to Canvas. I will also post instructions for writing your papers, which should each be approximately 550 to 650 words.

- Lowest Quiz Grade Dropped: Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped.
- **Replacing your Midterm Grade:** If you do better on the final exam than you did on the midterm, your grade for the final exam will replace your original grade for the midterm. For example, if you originally received a 30 on the midterm and then you received a 40 on the final, your updated grade for the midterm will be 40 points.
- Extra Credit: You will have the opportunity to get up to 3 extra credit points over the course of the semester. Information about extra credit opportunities will be posted periodically on Canvas.

Please note that your course grade is determined by points, not percentages, and that all points have equal weight, regardless of the assignment. Canvas is sometimes misleading when it tries to calculate your percentage grade for you; if you are in doubt about what your true course grade is going to be, *ignore the percentage that Canvas gives you* and simply calculate the number of points you have and the number of points you can still earn, keeping in mind my policies about dropping your lowest quiz grade and replacing your midterm exam grade with your final exam grade.

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION GRADE:

Our class will meet over Zoom 40 times this semester. Four absences will be automatically excused, but any additional absences will lower your attendance and participation grade according to the following chart: (Remember that attendance and participation are worth 20 points out of 200 for the semester.)

There is almost never a need to email me to have your absences excused. I do not need to know why you were gone. As the chart above illustrates, 4 absences are *automatically* excused no matter what reason you had to be absent, and any additional absences will lower your attendance and participation grade *regardless of your reason for being absent*.

There is one exception to this policy: in a case where at least *five* of your absences are justified by what the university deems to be "acceptable reasons," please email me at mollygardner@ufl.edu and I will consider evaluating you on participation only. https://catalog.ufl.edu/UGRD/academic-regulations/attendance-policies/. This exception does not apply when fewer than *five* of your absences are for good reasons. For example, if you had good reasons for being absent 4 times but were absent a total of 6 times, then the exception does not apply to you, and your maximum attendance/participation grade is 17 out of 20, as the chart above indicates.

- If you miss a quiz deadline, you will receive a 0 for that quiz; there will be no make-up quizzes this semester. (But remember that your lowest quiz grade will be dropped.)

I reserve the right to deduct between 0 and 10 points from an exam or paper grade for lateness.

Although you are free to study for quizzes and exams with other students, your work on the quizzes and exams must be your own. You may also discuss your paper ideas with me or other students. For help brainstorming, formatting, and writing your papers, you are welcome to take drafts of your papers to me or to the writing studio.

However, you must ultimately write your papers on your own, and you must cite your sources. Any citation style—MLA, Chicago, APA, or some variation—is acceptable. For information about how to avoid plagiarism, see the handouts I have uploaded to the non-required readings folder on Canvas.

Please note that you can bring me as many drafts of your papers as you like. However, I will not give *written* feedback on drafts—instead, I will provide you with *oral feedback* only, which means that you must set up a Zoom meeting with me to get feedback.
