PHI3551-1123(26575) - Thought Experiments

Course Description

Thought experiments are the bread and butter of philosophy. In this course we will discuss a number of well-known examples, both for their intrinsic interest and as a way of drawing morals about a particular philosophical question and about the method itself.

Learning Objectives

To make students familiar with several famous thought experiments and become skilled at close examination of hypothetical examples for the purpose of assessing their coherence and significance. They will also become acquainted with the contemporary debate about the propriety of appealing to thought experiments.

Students will be required to write three papers. The second may be a revision of the first in the light of the instructor's comments. If it is not, the third may be a revision of either of the first two. class participation can improve your final grade, but lack thereof cannot hurt it.
