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Course Description: The word ‘philosophy’ derives from Greek, and means ‘love of wisdom’. ‘Love of wisdom’, however, does not provide an adequately descriptive account of what philosophy is. Philosophy is concerned with theory building, and asking fundamental questions, such as: “what makes an action right or wrong?”, “is morality objective or subjective?”, “what does it mean to know something?”, and “what does an ideal state look like?”. This course will serve as a survey in philosophy. We will look at papers in different fields of philosophy, ranging from ethics to epistemology. The papers that we read will often present different views. It is not the goal of this course to persuade you into thinking a certain way. Rather, the goal is to get you thinking about complex ideas in a critical and organized fashion.

Required Texts and Readings: There are no textbooks required for this course. All materials will be made available via Canvas. All posted readings are mandatory. Please have all readings done before coming to class on the day that they are assigned.

Course Objectives:

- Learn how to read and engage with a piece of philosophical literature
- Learn how to write a piece of philosophical writing at the undergraduate level
- Learn how to speak and write in a concise, precise, and accurate fashion

Requirements Satisfied by Successful Completion of this Course: Students in this course can earn 4000 words towards the UF Writing Requirement (WR). The Writing Requirement (WR) ensures students both maintain their fluency in writing and use writing as a tool to facilitate learning. Course grades have two components. To receive writing requirement credit, a student must receive a grade of C or higher and a satisfactory completion of the writing component of the course. PHI2010 provides 3 credits towards the Philosophy major or minor, and is a General Education – Humanities (H) course as well.

Late Policy: Late assignments will not be accepted, and will receive an automatic 0. If the student is aware of any conflict with the date an assignment is due, it is the student’s responsibility to alert the instructor one week prior to the assignment’s due date. If the student is absent on the date that an assignment is due, and the absence is excused, then the student will have 24 hours to submit the

assignment without penalty. If the absence is unexcused, then the assignment will receive an automatic 0.

Nota Bene: In order for you to fare well in this course, there are several things that you need to do. First, you must come to class. If you are not in class, you will miss out on material, even if you get the notes from a friend. Moreover, coming to class is more than just sitting in your seat. You must be actively engaged, thinking on the issues that we discuss in class. Second, you must do your readings ahead of time. I will lecture on Mondays - Wednesdays on the readings, but I will not spoon feed the readings. I will lecture with an understanding that you have done the readings. Note, this does not mean that I expect for you to understand all of the reading on your own. It is your job to read. It is my job to help you understand what you have read. Third, you must take notes. You will not remember everything that is said in lecture. Moreover, take your notes with pen and paper. In part, because electronic devices are not allowed. Moreover, studies have shown that students learn better when they hand-write their notes. Lastly, see me in office hours if you have questions. Do not wait until the day before an assignment is due to come and see me. Be proactive in your education.

Assignments: There will be four assignments. All assignments will be submitted via Canvas. I do not read drafts of assignments, but you are encouraged to come and discuss your ideas with me in office hours.
