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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an in-depth introduction to the philosophy of Plato through the reading and discussion of several major dialogues and modern interpretive essays. The course will concentrate on the development of Plato's ethics and moral psychology while still devoting some attention to his epistemology and metaphysics. The course satisfies one of the Basic Distribution Requirements for the Philosophy M.A. and Ph.D.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course aims to provide graduate students a foundational understanding of the philosophy of Plato that will prepare them to both to teach Plato in courses of their own and to pursue more advanced work in the history of philosophy. More generally, this course, in conjunction with other required courses in the history of philosophy, is intended to provide graduate students with skills needed for advanced work in philosophy and with a broad competence in the history of philosophy.
