## **PHI 6226 - Syllabus**

Philosophy of language examines the phenomenon of language and seeks to understand it in its relations to the world and to human thought and communication. But many of the major contributors to this discourse were centrally concerned with language specifically in its relation to thought, reason and logic, not with language as a sociological or cultural phenomenon. In this seminar we will take up a series of issues in the theory of meaning with an eye toward critically interrogating key texts, and solving (or otherwise locating solutions to) those issues.

### **Course Work:**

The work of this course consists in the careful reading and analysis of difficult philosophical texts and participation in seminar discussion. Students will be called on to prepare in-class seminar presentations. A substantive thesis-defense paper will be due at the end of the seminar. Participation (25%), presentations (25%) and term paper (50%).
